The Indy Public Safety Foundation (IPSF) was established by civic leaders who recognized that complex public safety issues required collaboration between both the public and private sectors.

As Chair of the Indy Public Safety Foundation Board of Directors, it has been my honor to experience first-hand the great work of Indy's public safety agencies as well as the incredible talent and commitment of the more than 3,200 women and men who keep us safe each and every day.

As the only organization dedicated to supporting all of Indy's first responders, IPSF aims to develop financial and in-kind resources from the business community and individuals to fund innovative programs that address public safety issues or provide training, equipment, supplies or recognition for police officers, firefighters, EMTs, paramedics and more.

IPSF also serves as a champion of community engagement and youth development, through programs such as the Public Safety Citizens Academy, Indy Police Athletic & Activities League (PAL), IMPD Junior Cadets & Cadets and more.

IPSF is a first-responder centric fundraising organization

IPSF and IMPD have invested over \$200,000 to launch the IMPD Cadet program, inspiring the next generation of police officers and public servants. The Cadet program creates a diverse pipeline for youth ages 9 to 22 years old - focusing on relationship-building and workforce development. In 2020, IPSF aims to expand the program to serve all public safety agencies.



YOUR CONTRIBUTIONS OUR IMPACT



To build stronger youth-police relationships, IPSF has invested over \$100,000 in IMPD's Mountain Bike Skills Park, which has engaged over 2,000 youth as the only mountain bike park in an urban location nationwide.

Sponsored by IFD, Indiana Task Force One is one of 28 federal Urban Search & Rescue task forces that respond to local and national emergencies. IPSF invested over \$17,000 to outfit each task force member - many of which are volunteers - with high quality sleep systems to use during deployment.



In 2019, in partnership with IMPD, IPSF assumed administrative oversight of the Indy Police Athletic & Activities League (PAL). The original community-policing model, Indy PAL has been using sports and activities to build relationships and mentor under-appreciated youth in Indianapolis since 1940. In 2020, IPSF hired the first Director of Indy PAL in over 20 years; IPSF and IMPD are refreshing the program and leveraging partners to support the program's growth and continued impact.



The GAU provided workforce development for nearly 100 formerly incarcerated individuals while removing over 50,000 square feet of graffiti at no cost to Indy residents.

To do our part in addressing gun violence in Indy, IPSF partnered with IMPD, the City of Indianapolis and the faith-based community to offer Indy's first gun buyback program in over 6 years.

Through support from Old National Bank and other supporters, IPSF helps fund recognition and reward banquets and initiatives to honor the courageous work Indy's police, fire and EMS do every day to keep our community safe.



With IFD's leadership, IPSF invested \$7,500 to establish an Emergency Incident Needs Fund to provide vital needs such as food and water for first responders on-scene at large scale or emergency incidents.



Through a directed corporate donation, IPSF invested \$30,000 to secure over 1,000 pairs of "stick-resistant" gloves for first responders. These gloves will help reduce the likelihood of accidental sticks and exposure to infectious diseases or drugs that first responders experience during the course of their duties.



With IPSF's support, Indianapolis EMS has extended their Community-Based AED Program, which placed 44 Automatic External Defibrillators (AEDs) in accessible community locations and provided hands-only CPR training to over 3,000 community members.
